In response to Mr. Gonzalez's question, Ms. Allen replied that women are being trained in green jobs such as plumbing, and electricians. She stated that they work with the unions to get them jobs after completion.



SUBJECT: UPDATE ON THE HIGH CONCENTRATION OF ELIGIBLE YOUTH GRANT- YOUTH OF INCARCERATED PARENTS

Background:

Last August, WIB staff gave an update on the Governor's Workforce Investment Act Discretionary funded, High Concentration of Eligible Youth Grant. Monterey County was one of six, Workforce Investment Areas to be funded \$83,000 with an additional \$27,667 in matched funds, to provide priority and focused services to *Youth of Incarcerated Parents* [you all chose to focus on this category of youth at the January 2010 meeting].

The Office for Employment Training shall serve **25** youth, with a priority of serving *older youth* who are out of school, by collaborating with CBO's and other local agencies to provide:


- In-depth career assessment opportunities
- Vocational training
- Work experience
- On-the-job training opportunities

Successful performance outcomes for these youth will be based on:

- Receipt of a high school diploma or equivalent
- Enrollment in post-secondary education
- Employment or the military
- literacy & numeracy gains of at least one educational functioning level for those who are not in school at the time of enrollment & are basic skills deficient

The timeline for completing activities and projected outcomes for the 25 youth shall be on or before March 31, 2011. To date, eleven (11) enrolled youth participants have been identified as having "incarcerated" parents and could be provided Work Experience under this grant.

If you all feel this is a priority area of youth you would like to focus on, we can continue looking at future funding for providing additional services to youth of incarcerated parents.


The California Workforce Association (CWA) hosted its 11th annual youth conference entitled "*Our Time Our Voice*," January 18– 20, 2011.


